POS 2041 AMERICAN NATIONAL GOVERNMENT

Course Objectives:

- 1. To promote an understanding of the meaning of government, politics, and democracy as they relate to America.
- 2. To promote an appreciation of the historical development of American government.
- 3. To promote an understanding of the American system of federalism.
- 4. To promote an appreciation of the role of civil liberties and civil rights in American society.
- 5. To promote an understanding of the role of public opinion, interest groups, and mass politics in our political system.
- 6. To promote an appreciation of the significance of political parties and elections in the American governmental system.
- 7. To promote an understanding of the office of the Presidency and of the men who have held the position.
- 8. To promote an appreciation of the legislative branch of government, and of the process of turning bills into laws.
- 9. To promote an understanding of the judicial branch of government, and of the role of the Supreme Court in American life.

Course Requirements:
